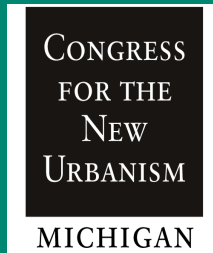

10:30 AM Nuts & Bolts of Form-Based Codes

Terry Sanford, AIA, Principal and Director of Urban Design and Architecture, Nederveld, Inc. and Vice President, MiCNU

Terry Sanford will provide an overview of form-based codes and will address the relationship between building facades and the public realm; the scale, form and mass of buildings in relation to one another, and the scale and types of streets and blocks. Terry will utilize photos and graphics to explain and illustrate the learning objectives of human scale design. Attendees will leave the presentation with an understanding of how form based codes function, the legal basis for form based codes, how form based codes are implemented, and how form based codes differ from Euclidian zoning. This session is a pre-cursor to the 3-part form-based code training scheduled for April 1-2, May 18-19 and July 13-14.

John Norquist, President and CEO of Congress for the New Urbanism

In this session, John Norquist gives an impassioned call-to-arms for everyone invested in the vitality of the American city. Norquist promotes New Urbanism as an alternative to sprawl and as an antidote to sprawl's social and environmental problems. John draws on his experience as a big-city mayor and prominent participant in national discussions for urban design and school reform. Attendees will leave the presentation with an understanding of the importance of urban design in reviving Michigan's economy, the value of implementing form-based codes, addressing issues regarding transit, promoting LEED and LEED-ND development, and building and rebuilding our streets with new street standards for Context Sensitive Design.
