Land Use Planning & Zoning:

Activities: Drafting policies, reviewing site plans, administering permits, ensuring compliance with local codes.

Regional Planning:

Activities: Inter-jurisdictional collaboration, regional comprehensive plans, multi-county infrastructure projects.

Transportation Planning:

Activities: Traffic studies, transit route planning, active transportation master plans, infrastructure development, advocating for multi-modal systems.

Environmental Planning:
